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

## KINGSWOOD HOA UPDATE

### COMMUNITY CENTRE/CLUBHOUSE



Construction of the community centre/clubhouse facility has progressed to a point where it's easy and exciting to envisage the finished building, and residents can now start counting down the months to opening week in the first days of spring 2025.

For anyone who hasn't recently visited the Kingswood gatehouse and surrounds, it's a most pleasant surprise to see the rapid progress of construction on the new community centre/clubhouse facility when gazing past the driving range towards York Street. In the middistance, the roof trusses tower and shine in the light of a bright autumn afternoon.





In the December 2024 edition of *The BUZZard*, it was reported that civil engineering works and the basement structure had advanced considerably, and brickwork on the ground floor had progressed to a stage where one could already get a proper perspective of what the finished product would ultimately comprise.

Today, construction work has advanced to a point where it's clear that this much-anticipated addition to the estate's offerings will be an aesthetically pleasing landmark that residents and golf members will delight in using, and proudly show off to guests and their families.

It has always been a priority for the Kingswood management team to become the Garden Route's preferred, secure, family-friendly residential golf estate. This new community facility will enable KGO to take great strides forward in its efforts to achieve this vision.

Trustees Jonathan Witts-Hewinson and Tony Jacobsen share the responsibility of leading the community centre/clubhouse subcommittee; below, they update readers on the current state of clubhouse affairs.

#### Real progress now utterly evident

Construction works pertaining to the new community centre/clubhouse facility are proceeding in line with the construction programme.

The erection of the roof sheeting is well advanced, and final work to ridges will be done in the coming weeks.

It is exciting to see how much real progress has been made to date.

Great headway is also being made with the works pertaining to the new practice putting green facility, which will be situated immediately to the north of the community centre/clubhouse site.

All things being equal, practical completion of the facility will be achieved by the third week of July and, barring anything unforeseen, the new centre – including the restaurant, players' facilities and the like – will be operational with effect from 1 September 2025.



#### **Bracing for opening week festivities**

The subcommittee is in charge of plans to have an exciting first week of opening events for all homeowners. It is hoped that every homeowner wishing to experience the new facilities – irrespective of whether or not they might be golfers – should have a special opportunity to use the facilities at the new community centre/clubhouse during the course of that opening week.

In addition to an opening golf day for homeowners only, to be played on 1 September 2025, and a members-only golf day to be hosted on Saturday the 6th, a series of evening events is planned to introduce all homeowners to the new facility.

Because of a number of constraints, these events will be split over three separate evenings, and further news in regard to which phases within Kingswood will be expected or invited on the different evenings will follow in the near future.




#### Don't enter, but feel free to appreciate



#### Daily data captured in monthly reports

'What's new?' was our question to Fielies Nieuwoudt when sitting down to exchange info for this edition of *The BUZZard*.

His response had rather a few addenda – suffice it to say, Kingswood's entire security system is now successfully digitised, allowing for a minimum of human error. 'We're making the most of technology, since security is a moving target,' he says.

The Security subcommittee's work is recorded meticulously in a monthly report distributed among role-players before they gather to discuss the past month's progress and

possible challenges. Fielies had the February edition of this important doc on the table to demonstrate the task at hand.

These monthly meetings give everyone a chance to contribute. The estate is represented by CEO Willem Jacobs and data are provided by maintenance manager Mornay Stoop, with Fidelity site manager Pieter van der Walt attending on behalf of security personnel.

'Information is received daily and processed by security coordinator Caron Manchest. Data typically include info such as which camera captured unwanted traffic, or the frequency of alarms going off, as well as facts and figures on traffic at access gates, equipment used, and incident reports. Finally, this information is shared with our trustees – we have to show how our budget is being sensibly spent.'

#### Smile for the camera

First up, when perusing graphics contained on the early pages of this monthly KGE security tome, it's telling that 'all the yellow bits' are provided with camera equipment, these points covering a vast portion of the estate's 9.6km perimeter.

Also indicated in bright colours are kiosks reticulated with power and fibre cable, and data communication points that lead to the server room located alongside the contractors' gate, to which it's connected with Wi-Fi equipment and network cables.





'The fibre currently installed measures 2,734 metres and enables camera coverage of an area spanning 2,621 metres,' explains Fielies. He reminds that the security team is also in charge of all points where access is managed: four homeowners' gates, the contractors' gate and one connecting gate to George Golf Course, all of which are furnished with multiple cameras.

'We worked all December to perfect and refine this plan, keeping in mind the estate's non-homogeneous exterior – rivers, neighbourhood streets, green belts and more.

'When considering cameras on the fence bordering the golf park, for instance, we have to respect those residents' privacy.' He adds that, although all cameras are mapped, it's not in the interest of good security practice to divulge their exact locations.

KGE currently comprises 763 stands, on 630 of which building has been concluded. The gatehouse and new clubhouse/community centre now under construction form part of the estate's fixed built facets.

'The reality is that Kingswood Estate covers 220 hectares and therein exists the challenge of safeguarding the entire area, its borders and surrounds. This includes the Outeniqua Research Farm; roads comprising Plattner Boulevard, Airway Road, Meent Street and Barkhuizen Drive; links with Fancourt and George golf courses; green belts and other bushy areas.'

#### On equipment and other staggering stats

Figures pertaining to electrical wiring and CCTV cameras on site are as follows:

- · Gate 1 18 cameras
- · Gate 2 12 cameras
- Gate 3 10 cameras
- Gate 4 18 cameras
- · Contractors' gate 9 cameras
- Perimeter 26 thermal cameras
- · Inverters (gates and control room) 6
- · Inverters (fence) 4
- · Lithium batteries (fence) 4

The current permanent perimeter fibre fence coverage comprises 400m at Phase 1 and 900m at Phase 2, while the mobile Smurf security camera covers a radius of about 300m of the area in which it's strategically placed.

Tools that assist KGE's human security crew are countless, including everything from a base radio to handheld radios, torches, batons and mobile phones. The control room is manned by Fidelity staff – the company currently fulfilling its five-year contract – on a 24/7 surveillance basis.



Natasha van Wyk is one of the security staffers who monitor the control room during 12-hour shifts, typically from 6am to 6pm; she was part of the security team at McCain Foods until its closure in February 2014, and has been in the safety business since the late 90s.



The site manager, supervisors, controllers and guards are equipped with paintball guns, body cameras and handcuffs, a four-wheel drive vehicle, motorbike and golf cart, as well as a drone, tablets and scanners. Access control is virtually managed by Gallagher, which operates via cellphone technology.

#### **Counting feet**

Numbers of homeowners and golf members accessing the estate via the Gallagher app hit a monthly total of 46,066 during January, while over 32,000 visitors





entered via the My Estate Life app (MEL, i.e. those without Gallagher access).

Others categories entered for the month can be broken down as follows:

- Service providers and construction workers 9,592
- · Deliveries 2,407
- Walk-ins through turnstiles (domestic and garden workers) 21,536

This last category of foot traffic also gains access via facial recognition tech at the gate – and when witnessing this process first-hand, one clearly hears the face-bot saying 'thank you' after each scan. During January 2025, the average total of thank-yous was 1,025 per day!

The number of those registered on the Gallagher app currently stands at 2,176 users, with MEL users at 1,011 and those registered for facial recognition at the turnstiles counting 9,377. These stats paint a vivid picture of the





vast task when considering daily and monthly access management at all of Kingswood's entry points.

#### Single incident an inside job

There were no major issues to report in December, even in the context of increased seasonal visitors, and the only incident reported in January involved the theft of



garden equipment that disappeared from outside a house in the first week of the year.

Fielies and his fellow subcommittee members are convinced that this was an inside job. 'Take into account that trucks or vehicles leaving the property aren't searched to check the content of each box. We urge residents to be vigilant. Remember that criminals are innovative and have lots of time on their hands!'

This brings us to the necessity of Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) regarding access control at all entry points, which currently stand at 16 and pertain to the multitude of ways that various visitors should be dealt with.



'A case in point is when someone enters the estate in an Uber, for example. The apt SOP in this instance is to grant access to the driver rather than via the resident's phone app, thus allowing the driver to exit the estate again. Our training in this context is non-stop, to ensure that all security personnel remain on top of this ever-evolving environment.'

#### Note these numbers

'The security control room remains in its temporary housing container, and will be resettled once the new clubhouse complex is completed and space in the gatehouse is repurposed for this control hub and other tenants,' says Fielies.

'Most importantly, the control room is operational 24/7 and the OmniVision staff will gradually be phased out.

When we're one hundred per cent happy that our staff training is complete, we'll be able to do without any outside personnel.'

Residents are urged to have these numbers handy to report suspicious behaviour, and remember that there

is a panic button on the MEL app:

Please be sure to use these numbers for security matters only. Remember that a puppy irritating you with its yelping is an estate management rather than security issue. Fielies and his subcommittee colleagues urge residents to call these numbers for security-related issues only, and to consult the house rules when uncertain. 'In case of a nuisance, please make sure your complaint gets to the right people,' he says.

#### The luxury of troubleshooting

'All that remains for this year is the addition of cameras and the digging of trenches. By the end of May or early June, we'll have completed the expansion of fence



cameras, as well as the fibre and electrical cables feeding it,' according to Fielies.

'So approved projects for 2025 are on track and all steps are being taken to secure Kingswood residents.

'With no notable incidents to report, you can rest assured that nothing got over the fence or through our gates that we didn't know about. We are now in a position to handle troubleshooting, since all systems are doing their job!'

Homes, roads and underpass are all part of current construction projects.

Apart from the steady flow of construction on private properties,

Kingswood residents can look forward to road repairs which, upon completion, will improve their driving experience within the estate and enhance resident safety.

Kingswood's fabulous new community centre/clubhouse facility is the primary theme of discussion when considering the most high-profile of current construction works. Still, several other projects are either on the go or in the near-future pipeline.

Having a sit-down with KGE Facilities and Compliance Manager, Dan de Wet, is always a pleasure, as his days are filled with issues covering everything from wildlife management to conflict resolution. Dan's dry sense of humour, combined with a deep understanding of managing man and beast at Kingswood for the past 14 years, makes for a riveting exchange of information.



#### Roadworks that work

Residents in the vicinity of Longbridge, Manor Road and Brookside can prepare for some remedial roadworks taking place on these thoroughfares as part of the Kingswood HOA's efforts to maintain infrastructure and, where possible, proceed with the motto that prevention is better than cure.

'A case in point,' says Dan, 'is the road at Brookside. On the left side, when moving in a southerly direction, we'll be doing some stone pitching to control storm water. This work has been commissioned to ensure that we won't be caught unawares in case of heavy downpours in the coming winter months.'

As has been mentioned elsewhere in this edition, the cement path that connects the 18th green to the 1st tee has become tricky to negotiate in golf carts. 'The plan is to make the turn wider so that the incline is not so steep, which should go a long way towards preventing carts from losing traction when the road is wet.'



Dan says the first of these projects already kicked off on 7 March and that the work on roads and related infrastructure is due to be completed by 2 May. Residents are asked to be patient with contractors, their staff and vehicles while this important work is under way.

Repairs to large sections of Kingston and Longbridge roads as part of an asset maintenance programme, as well as the measures to reduce disruption of traffic, will be made known well in advance of works starting.

#### Go figure

To put the numbers relating to the building operations and transfers concluded at Kingswood this year so far into perspective, it helps to revisit the figures for 2024, printed in the December edition of *The BUZZard*.

At the time, according to HOA management team member Lize van Heerden, there were 35 active building

sites and, by year's end, a total of 36 completion certificates had been issued. Finally, 66 resale transfers took place during the course of last year.

Dan's update since the publication of the last newsletter is as follows:

- · Seven completion certificates have been issued.
- There are currently 35 active building sites on the estate, which include both alterations or additions and new builds, i.e. complete homes.
- The above does not include the major building sites of the clubhouse/community centre, or the Village development that is under way on the estate's Rooi River border, which is being carried out by Lumacon Construction.
- As mentioned above, several smaller and more substantial projects include the repair or upgrade of



roads and infrastructure in various areas across the property.

#### Let common sense and courtesy prevail

Dan reminds that all residents have access to guidelines pertaining to the maintenance of existing homes – such as colour schemes for painting, the height of exterior walls, and preferred roof materials.

'It's easy enough to follow these general architectural pointers, and to ensure that your property is clean and neat. This protects the image of the estate and promotes the Kingswood brand to the benefit of all owners and investors,' he says.

He explains that contractors are required to cordon off their building sites, and that there is a zero-tolerance rule in terms of access to anyone but the working teams. When it comes to gardens, the requirement for cleaning and cutting goes without saying, albeit that individual owners are free to garden with gay abandon, considering the Kingswood Plant List and 80/20 indigenous/exotic distribution. 'But please consult with the HOA first before working on verges.'





#### Facilities and compliance management

Dan is the go-to guy for residents dealing with building and infrastructure issues. But in the line of that duty, he also sometimes has to deal with interpersonal issues that result from homeowners' concerns or nuisances experienced.

'Always take your neighbours into consideration and remember that communication is key when it comes to alterations of any kind. Please report any emergencies – serious electrical problems or issues relating to water supply or burst pipes that could damage homes and run up water bills – to Masadi at the HOA offices in the Gatehouse Building, or contact the 24/7 Control Room (landline: 087 537 9733, mobile and WhatsApp: 083 522 0731).

Community Liaison/Marketing & Communications manager Charleen le Roux has been pulling her weight in the KGE offices since last year and has now earned her permanent appointment, while brand-new Operations manager Piet van Heerden took up his post in the beginning of March; read on for some inside info on these two HOA-insiders.

#### Ladies first ...

Charleen has been a permanent George resident since 2019, although she has lived here before while working for Media24 some decades ago. An only child, Charleen was born in Bethlehem; by the time she turned three, the family moved to the Maclear area where she started school at Ugie Primary.

When the time came to go to high school, Charleen and her mother traded the Eastern Cape for the Western Cape, where she matriculated at Strand High. Her school career is studded with accomplishments and service records, such as representing the Junior Tourism Board of Somerset West, being an ACVV cell group leader and school prefect.

'In my second year, I was chosen to serve on the House Committee, where my portfolio was Arts and Culture. The next year, I was on the Student Council as Arts and Culture representative and was the Baptism Captain for first-year student initiations – such fun! I also represented our college on the Stellenbosch Tourism Board.'

#### Working across the waters

After Stellenbosch, Charleen spent two years in London, where she earned experience in the medical and transport industries. 'Apart from an admin position at the pension department of London Rail and Transport, I worked for Dr Trixie Pieterse as a receptionist at one of her South African Mediclinic branches in Putney.

'Garth and I got married in November 2023, so it's still a relatively new union, but he is my rock. Last, but actually most importantly, I believe in Abba Father, and our family serves Him in all we do.'

#### Work and play

Charleen loves music. 'During my high school years, I did backup vocals for a band called HEART and we performed at schools and churches, sometimes even at weddings. In college, I occasionally sang at functions and Gospel bashes and was later a lead vocalist at church events.

'I haven't sung in a long time now, but I'll twist Marina's (Flear, Kingswood Finance Manager) arm to start playing the piano again, and then I'll just hum along,'



she smiles. But Charleen admits she can't bake to save her life – 'even though I had Home Economics from Grade 8 to matric. The teachers eventually begged me to consider another subject ...

'I really enjoyed Art at school, and come from a very artistic and language-oriented family on my grandmother's side. Her brother, Ghoete "Ollie" Olwagen, was Huisgenoot subeditor for many years. His daughter, Mariëtte Olwagen, has spent most of her career as content manager, editor, and layout artist for Die Burger.'

Charleen says she is very excited to be part of the Kingswood team. The position of Community Liaison/Marketing and Communications manager is a new role created by the Kingswood HOA, and it's clear they've found the right candidate. 'I'm passionate about helping people and feel very privileged to form part of the HOA team. It's a small but highly professional and talented team'

#### Meet Piet: Kingswood's peerless new ops ace

When chatting to Piet van Heerden in his mother tongue, one wants to peg that accent at once. 'I grew up on a Karoo farm close to Victoria West, and matriculated at Paarl Boys' High.' So that explains the gentle fall of vowels when speaking Afrikaans. But switching to English is effortless for this highly qualified, well-travelled addition to Kingswood's HOA outfit.

Piet kicked off his studies at the University of Stellenbosch (US) with a BCom in Economics and Management Science. Five years later he was back in the Eikestad to attain his MBA from the US Business School, scoring distinctions in Financial Evaluation and General Management.

These qualifications were capped by a course in Advanced Project Management from the University of Cape Town in 2017. But in-between studies, Piet has built up a CV that is as diverse as it is impressive. The golden thread, however, is a focus on management and planning.

A nutshell version of his work history starts off with a stint in Gauteng as distribution planner for the Super Group Supply Chain Partner, then managing a similar portfolio for Afrox; Piet was key account manager at Wolwefontein Farm in the Karoo and operations/general manager for Just Water.

While living in Centurion for three years, he also worked in the investment industry. 'I love the investment game,' he admits – and that brings to mind Piet's WhatsApp profile picture, showing him with his hand on the horn of the Wall Street Bull – the famous bronze sculpture in New York's financial district. And what's not to love about a bullish market?

From March 2014 to September 2022, Piet served as Operations manager for the Bexgroup, running operations at depots as far flung as Jan Kempdorp in the Northern Cape, Morreesburg in the Swartland, and Vereeniging in the Vaal Triangle. 'So I was travelling





quite a bit, and responsible for dozens of staff at the different depots while working on business strategies for the group,' he explains.

One of Piet's most recent forays is being co-owner of project management company RenovaFix – a role that helped hone his skills to perfection for the portfolio he is now charged with at Kingswood.

#### Coming 'home' to George

During his nine-year stint as ops manager with Bexgroup, Piet directed the site managers at depots in three provinces from the company's HQ in Stellenbosch. While building up RenovaFix, he relocated to Somerset West, where he still owns a home. But the Van Heerden clan has a long connection with the Garden Route.

'My parents retired to George after selling the farm, and have lived at Kingswood since the early 2010s, while other family members such as my cousin and aunt have also moved to the town or surrounds. We share a holiday home on the Island in Groot Brakrivier with family and, although we don't crowd one another, our holidays together are always fun.'

#### Sport and travel genes

Piet inherited his dad's competitive golfing gene and played at provincial level for Boland while at 'Boishaai'. 'I'm passionate about sports and have loved playing golf from a very young age.' Padel and running are also favourite pastimes, and he regards the Knysna half-marathon as a highlight. 'Sports are big in my life, but golf remains number one.' Well, sir, it seems you've come to the right place ...



Other than hitting the golf course several times a week, Piet enjoys spending time at the ocean, eating good food and collecting fine wines – not to mention the tasting and pairing of them with the aforementioned food.

He is also no novice when it comes to procuring something wholesome and home-reared for the pot. 'While growing up on a farm, we used to hunt quite regularly.' But these days, he says, time doesn't really allow for frequenting the hunting grounds.

Finally, Piet loves travelling and, apart from the New York trip mentioned above, has also visited Chicago. When considering foreign favourites outside of the States, he says Greece has delivered memorable adventures – especially his time spent in the capital of Athens and on the island Santorini.

When it comes to top destinations in South Africa, Piet rates Leopard Creek Golf Estate in Mpumalanga as right up there. 'But most of the time I prefer the coast – anywhere close to the sea. I love the buzz of Cape Town's Waterfront, Clifton and Camps Bay, but the West Coast is just as special.'

Fortunately, from his new Kingswood base, the closest beach is but a hop and skip away. But most probably, when not busy grabbing the ops-bull by its horns, you'll find Piet perfecting his game on Kingswood's gorgeous golf course.





The wetter the late-summer weather, the better for our greens and dams, explains the expert in charge of Kingswood's course.

Climate patterns can make Kingswood greenkeeper Ivan van Heerden's life a misery or turn it into a song; when considering this year so far, the weather gods have been kind enough to this competent golf course connoisseur and his compact team.

'We can't complain about the weather – although December was hot and January dished up a handful of scorchers, our rainfall total for the year stands at 150mm, which has been a great help to keep the course healthy and replenish our water features,' says Ivan.

When elaborating on the impact of rainfall on the estate's dam levels, he puts it into recent-past perspective. 'Historically, the month of February has been warmer than was the case this year. Although the days were mostly mild in January, our dams were very empty by early February – so much so that we sent notices out to residents'

He explains that depleted dam levels create a 'quicksand effect' when the water recedes, leaving a residue of sludge around the waterline. This situation makes it dangerous for man and beast, both of which

may get stuck in the mud – for instance when resident youngsters and their dogs brave the dry-running dams in search of lost golf balls.

'At least we got enough late-summer rain to help us out of trouble. So in retrospect we had a good summer and the course looks great again. Our efforts to deal with the extra rounds played during season included slowing down the greens.' This is attained, he says, by using a little more fertiliser and by minimising the double cut, 'creating less roll to counter increased traffic on the course'.

#### Maintenance yes, new machines not yet

The process of acquiring new machinery for the greenkeeping team has been covered extensively in the previous edition of *The BUZZard*, so there's nothing new to report on the acquisitions front. 'Our first






replacement will only kick in closer to the end of this year, in October or November, when the equipment in question reaches its fifth year of life.'

Maintenance, however, has no sell-by date. At the time of our meeting, Ivan was busy with a fairway bunker on the 17th. 'This work is now in progress with the aim of encouraging golfers to play more towards the left than the right, so changing the angle of the hole.

'Homes on the right-hand side of this fairway have been





getting flak from fly-away balls, and we're hoping that this remedial action will fix that problem. We try where possible to accommodate homeowners who feel under fire, even though most homes are out of harm's way. Unfortunately, this is not completely within our control.

'Of course, no one wants residents, their kids or pets to risk being hit by balls. So where it falls into our risk assessment portfolio, we do our best to regulate the direction of play.' Ivan adds that much work has been done on the 5th to improve a similar situation, so they're confident that their current project on the 17th will change the dynamics of this hole.



#### Beware the underpass ...

During our chat with Ivan, KGE maintenance manager Mornay Stoop stuck his head around the door to advise that Asla agents had just rocked up on site to discuss work required on the underpass below Plattner Drive.

'This track has become problematic, especially in wet weather, when the combination of a steep incline and slippery surface prevents proper traction when traversed by golfers in their carts,' says Ivan.

The underpass road connects the 18th green to the 1st tee, so it's an essential part of movement on the course, but at the moment the team is exploring ways to address the issue of incline by changing the camber to allow for a longer turn that is not as steep, especially when the road is slippery.

The big question now is whether players will be tolerant during the process of this complicated remedial work, for would be less annoyed with their golf carts slipping and sliding throughout the pending rainy season.





Ivan discussed possible ways of widening the road without entirely blocking access with the Asla representatives, but it's evident that this project will take time and patience. 'The job should be tackled this month and is the biggest thing going on track right now,' he says.

#### Sustainability is key

Ivan reminds that sustainability is an overarching consideration in all their actions on Kingswood's golf course. Among these count the establishment of more natural and marked-out areas with the most ecology-friendly vegetation.

'We try to ensure that there's ample space for *Eragrostis* curvula (common name: weeping lovegrass) to grow out. This facilitates the movement of wildlife on the estate while also promoting birdlife – and with smaller mowable areas, we use less diesel in the long run.'

Another practical example of how the use of lawnmowers can be reduced entails the cutting around greens. 'We now cut only one line around the green instead of the standard five. This translates into a collar of up to 1.8 metres compared to a band of over 7 metres in width. With smaller collars, mower use is substantially reduced.'

When it comes to putting greens, the use of organic fertiliser, added sand and increased aeration add to the longevity of these well-manicured areas. The focus is on using fewer chemicals and keeping it natural, which creates a safer environment for the estate's animals, residents, and bees.

'We work with the estate motto "Green, greener, Kingswood" foremost in our minds,' says Ivan. And although, for health and safety reasons, there are no beehives on the estate, they ensure that natural hives are relocated to bee-friendly farms.

#### Preventative action essential

'Turf health is our first priority – we don't want anything to burn in the sun or take blows in the line of golfing pursuits. We're happy that everything is now back to where it should be, with fewer golfers treading the course after the seasonal influx.'

Finally, Ivan says that in terms of further course improvements, a longer-term plan involves settlement of the 7th. But this work is yet to be confirmed once budgets and related issues have been approved – and readers are invited to watch this space.



## Michél Nunes, Raffaele D'Amato Jewellers

### This third-generation design maestro is also a gem of a human being

Kingswood resident Michél Nunes is at the helm of the world-renowned Raffaele D'Amato Jewellers in Garden Route Mall.

When perusing the website of Raffaele D'Amato Jewellers, one is blown away by the superior bling displayed in full colour: breathtaking examples of this design emporium's handcrafted art light up the screen. But nothing quite compares to seeing these jewels and gems with the naked eye.

The BUZZard visited Raffaele D'Amato Jewellers in the heart of Garden Route Mall to catch up with proprietor and master designer Michél Nunes. Armed with the reams of info at www.damato.co.za as background, it's hard not to gush when in the presence of Michél, and surrounded by handcrafted masterpieces to die for.

#### Part of Cape craftsman history

A truncated version of the family's beginnings in South Africa starts when Italian POW Raffaele D'Amato came to the continent's southernmost outpost in search of a better life. Here, the master watchmaker wed wife Monica and shared this talent with their son, Deryck Nunes, who opened the first Raffaele D'Amato Jewellers in Paarl in 1957.

Fast-forward to George some decades later, where the talented father-and-son team opened an outlet in the CBD to repair, sell and manufacture watches and jewellery. This is where Michél – Deryck and Marlene's son – came into the picture, joining the business in 1989.

It was a veritable full-circle event, as Michél first started working in the family jewellery store when he was eight years old, following in the footsteps of his master watchmaker father and grandfather.

#### Saying 'no' to the Big C, 'yes' to life

But 1989 was also the year when Michél was diagnosed with bone cancer and described by doctors as 'terminally ill' with a relapse three years later. Having won that battle with the help of chemo and an iron will, he was put to the test once more when diagnosed with advanced colon cancer in 2012.

Again he conquered this illness, and his achievements today are a testament to his determination to live life to the fullest. Michél believes in pushing the limits – a fact demonstrated not only by his pioneering work in jewellery design, but also in hobbies not necessarily associated with the arts.

After doing his compulsory military service in the SA Air Force, he obtained his private pilot's licence and traversed the skies for many years. Now retired from flying, he remains an enthusiast and has attended events such as the Red Bull Air Show in Portugal. He also loves motorcar racing and has done many advanced driver courses.

#### Combo of talent and training

Learning from the best helped Michél to become one of the country's leading designers, but that first-hand instruction was augmented by a slew of qualifications personally attained as soon as he was released by the old South Africa's armed forces.

A BA degree in Creative Arts: Jewellery and Industrial Metal Design from Stellenbosch University was



followed by an FGA in coloured gems and diamonds from the Gemmological Association of Great Britain. Then, in 2016 in Canada, Michél proceeded to become a Graduate Jeweller with the Canadian Jewellers Association.

'I wanted to be a watchmaker but doing the sevenyear course in Switzerland was not an option, so off I went to Stellenbosch. At school I was more of a science guy and art was never really my thing, but I realised that gemmology combined science, trigonometry and subjects I enjoyed as a youngster.'

Michél's lecturers at the Stellenbosch Jewellery Department, Herbert Pienaar and Dave Glenister, later became his promoters and colleagues in gemmology. 'I was the only student to score full marks in my gemmology practical exam, still holding the record to this day,' he smiles, but adds that he had to work really hard to master the art side of things.

'In the same way one can acquire a taste for, say, olives, I acquired a knack for the course's artistic requirements.' This paid off to the point where Michél went on to lecture in jewellery design at Stellenbosch University before returning to the family business.



#### Awards and awesome staff

In 1990, Michél won the Elegant Man of the Year design award for his 'Elegant Time' brooch, and was one of five designers selected by De Beers to contribute to the 'Just for You' Woman with Style competition.

Three decades on, Michél maintains an active interest in design trends and gemmology developments, keeping close ties with Britain's Gemmological Association. He has served on the Jewellery Council of SA as panellist for many years and is a member of the Diamond Dealers Club of South Africa.

These ties with the national and international industry have put him in a perfect position to ensure that Raffaele D'Amato Jewellers remains at the top of its game. After Dad Deryck passed on in 2008, Michél has taken the business to the next level, ably supported by mom Marlene and their multi-talented team.

'We are one of the only jewellery businesses in SA that has been in the same family for 68 years. I learnt early life lessons in the line of duty – when I got mad at my dad, I would walk around the block and then come back just to realise that I have nowhere else to go, so just carried on working in the store!'

Today, he puts in his hours from 8am to 4pm daily at the gorgeous Garden Route Mall store, with Mom Marlene still very much part of its daily running. Marlene and Michél are supported by an ever-loyal team, including an expert watchmaker who has been in their employ for the past 11 years, with two of the store's staff having been 'part of the family' for 27 and 21 years respectively.

His continued studies in CAD (computer-aided design) have proved to be a winning recipe in business, as it allows Michél to digitally create 2D drawings and 3D models of jewellery before the manufacturing process starts. 'With 3D CAD, you can share, review, simulate, and modify designs, so clients can be part of the process when seeing their desired piece come to life on a computer screen in ray-traced images.'

#### Hot cocktails and crazy border crossings

Michél holds an EU passport as well as Canadian residency, and used to share his time twixt South Africa and the land of Mounties and maples. 'But at the



moment I'm needed here for business reasons and I'm putting all my energy into the jewellery store, as George is now truly a boomtown.'

He says that the lifestyle in the Southern Cape capital is on par with a first-world city such as Vancouver, citing as example the abundance of George restaurants serving excellent food, complemented by the town's beautiful natural surrounds

But he can write a book about standout experiences and memorable travels during the past three decades. Among these count a close call with the wildfires that devastated British Columbia, shortly after the Knysna fire of June 2017. 'We evacuated with only our cats and most important papers. Then, just 5km from our house, the wind turned and we came off unscathed.'

In 2012, while still on chemo pills and strongly discouraged from any travels, Michél and a friend set off on an MSC cruise from Marseilles that included stops in Tunisia, the Amalfi Coast, Mallorca, and Ibiza. 'I did everything I wasn't supposed to do, like having cocktails that had to be heated up so as not to interfere with my medication!' Another excellent trek, in 2014, traversed the Western Pacific seaboard from Florida to Portland, Oregon. And then there was the time when Michél and

his partner in crime crossed a border between the States and Canada on foot – but that adventure may be best covered if ever he pens his tome of tantalising travel tales.

#### The crispness of Kingswood

'A crisp estate' is how Michél aptly describes Kingswood, where he bought his first house back in 2008. 'I sold that home when planning to leave the country for good, but then returned ... and rented my own townhouse!'

Now in his second Kingswood abode, he says it's the perfect place to come home to after long hours at the grindstone. 'Sometimes all I want to do is sleep, and it's unbelievable that one can live on a busy estate street but never be bugged by the noise of passing traffic.'

When 'noise' is called for, however, Michél puts on his favourite EDM tunes and loses himself in the music. A fan of all things electronic, he loves



gadgets, computers and the latest software. He is also an accomplished photographer and when looking at his Insta-page, his favourite subject may well be beloved cuddle cat, Princess Leia.

'When sporadically pining for that vast Canadian landscape with its redwoods and bears, I look at the mountain views and cuddle Leia, and then there is nowhere else in the world I'd rather be'





#### Bespoke traffic-calming measures best plan to protect all Kingswood road users

'Traffic' is a subject that popped up during *The BUZZard's* meetings with Kingswood's CEO and Security subcommittee chairman, as well as its maintenance and community liaison managers; subsequently, an independent traffic consultant's comprehensive report placed the current status quo and actions required into perspective.

When perusing the monthly Kingswood security report – the focus of an article elsewhere in this edition – the section on traffic measures currently implemented comprises but a small part of this detailed document, and mostly deals with the frequency at which the Truvelo speed camera is used.

The date and time, operator and camera positions feature, as do the number of penalties issued. Some of the recipients were displeased over receiving a citation when driving on home turf, albeit at speeds not safe for fellow road users, be these individuals behind the wheel, on two wheels or on foot

Dr Tanja Visser is an expert on traffic but also a Kingswood homeowner, which means she's personally moved to advise in the best interests of fellow residents





'In some cases, two-way stops will be turned into threeways, while several other traffic-calming measures will be installed. We are timing these to piggyback on existing repair requirements. For instance, when resurfacing Kingston Road, we'll work on the new raised intersection at the same time,' Willem explains.

'We are painfully aware that this is an emotive issue, where people are sometimes prone to overreaction and perceptions that may not be based on fact. One speedster does not mean that everyone is speeding, but when kids and animals enter the fray, emotional reactions replace calm consideration of the actual situation'

#### Overlapping with security and maintenance



- including kids, the elderly and differently-abled - as well as wildlife traversing the estate's roads.

#### In this context, KGE is not unique

A quick internet search will inform interested parties that the issue of speeding and subsequent augmentation measures is a general challenge at estates across South Africa and the globe. The August 2024 edition of The BUZZard featured an article on speeding penalties and their implications at residential estates.

This notion was reiterated by Kingswood CEO Willem Jacobs, who appeals to residents to be patient during various phases of roadworks and related projects planned for several roads within the estate over the next few months

The seriousness of updated road regulations was echoed by the chairperson of Kingswood's subcommittee charged with security, Fielies Nieuwoudt: 🖼 'The traffic issue is enjoying renewed attention and energy, since many residents are unfortunately  $\pm$ disregarding speed limits."

The subcommittee has decided to up the frequency with which the estate's Truvelo speed camera will be used. 'But we're not divulging where the camera will be placed on which days, as that will reduce its efficiency," he says, adding that the camera is monitored by a trained and accredited operator from Fidelity.

'As we speak, it was decided that at least 20 additional stop signs will be erected, as well as additional speed bumps, to ensure the most effective traffic-calming measures.



The point is, if you hurt your car by speeding over a bump, you only have yourself to blame.'

The board of trustees approved the installation of new three-way stop streets as part of our ongoing efforts to enhance traffic safety within the estate. Although the installation of these stop signs has already commenced and will be completed before the end of March, the progress of these upgrades will be weather-dependent, and different contractors have been tasked with carrying out various aspects of the upgrades.

Residents are kindly requested to exercise caution and remain viailant in areas where these new stop signs are being installed. Some intersections will be converted into four-way stop streets, while others will become three-way stop streets.

Further communication regarding additional trafficcalming measures and estate-wide upgrades will be shared at a later stage. The cooperation of Kingswood residents is appreciated as it assists the HOA in ensuring a safer environment for all residents, workers and visitors.

#### **Current status quo**

Kingswood is a residential, lifestyle and golf estate with a diverse set of road users, ranging from children to the elderly and animals, through to cars, trucks and construction vehicles. 'But,' says Dr Tanja Visser, 'development plans did not allow for pedestrians and cyclists in terms of infrastructure, resulting in a shared road space."

The consequence is that vulnerable road users compete with dangerous, hard-bodied vehicles when traversing the estate. Speed is a critical element to managing road safety, and the successful enforcement of low travel speeds at Kingswood is necessary due to the shared road space, according to Tanya's traffic recommendations

'Research has determined that the impact speed after which the risk of death escalates for pedestrians, bicyclists and motorcyclists is 30kph, and international experts Rosen and Sander recommend that communities select target speeds of 30kph or lower due to safety benefits, particularly for pedestrians.'

The current speed limit in Kingswood is set at 30kph, but the document in question features graphics that explain the relationship between vehicle and pedestrian collision speeds and survival rates. Stats contained in a table demonstrate that, for a shared road space and street circumstance such as Kingswood's, the ideal speed limit should be between 10kph and 20kph.

#### Traffic calming to be cost-effective

'It is important that drivers should not have to be taught about traffic-calming devices for them to be effective. They should be self-explanatory and self-enforcing,' says Tanja, adding that these measures are most effective when implemented as part of an area-wide approach, i.e. applied across a network of streets rather than just a few sections of the roadway.

'Good traffic regulations are self-enforcing, rather than relying on the driver's goodwill or police enforcement. Moreover, enforcement places a burden on Kingswood resources both in terms of cost and personnel, and creates an environment of conflict. Legal action, even if unjustified, might consume further resources, leading to hostility best avoided in a residential estate,' she says.

#### Two birds with one stone

The document suggests a set of road-safety improvements, conscious of the fact that these will have to be retrofitted and that work has to be carried out with a prescribed budget. The idea is to maximise existing infrastructure and expand on it, ideally altering drivers' behaviour for the better.

'Having consistent stop street protocols can change the driving culture within the estate, which would positively impact the effectiveness of other trafficcalming measures in Kingswood,' says Tanya. She recommends that stop street compliance is strictly managed, especially after initial implementation, as there is no excuse for drivers to disregard stop streets.

Where possible, the plan is to 'kill two birds with one stone' by combining existing golf-cart crossings with a raised platform and pedestrian crossing, elevating the crossing status and safety, while forcing vehicles to lower their travel speeds.

'It's imperative that street signage should always be clearly visible. This counts for road markings as well as signposts. All raised platforms should ideally be painted to indicate the elevation change to drivers from a distance. Where possible, raised platforms should be located near lighting fixtures to improve visibility at night,' advises Tanya.

#### Straight roads and new challenges

Certain roads within the estate have long, straight




sections without sharp bends, intersections with other roads, or pedestrian crossings that would necessarily break a vehicle's speed.

'In future, once the suggested traffic-calming measures have been implemented and if infringements still occur on these stretches, additional sets of speed humps at 80m to 100m intervals can be considered,' she says. These roads include, but are not limited to, Riage Drive plus Brookside, Ringwood, Kingston, Longbridge, Edgeley and Knightsbridge roads.


'Considering the flow and movement of golf carts and pedestrians between the new community centre/clubhouse and parking lots and the intersection between Kingswood Boulevard and Lancaster Road is very important. The intersections with the two new developments beyond the clubhouse also need to be considered when planning traffic-calming interventions for this part of the estate, and this also applies to the future Kingswood Court development.'

Residents are urged to look out for notifications regarding traffic installations in their midst, and to be tolerant when encountering Mornay and his team in the line of duty.
